WELCOME TO OUR HOME

For over a century, Turner has delivered specialist residential and nursing care for men with mental health challenges, memory loss and acquired brain injury - a mission that remains unchanged since our doors opened in 1883. Of those care organisations working from historic buildings, only a handful continue to deliver the exact specialist support they did at inception.

We are proud to be one of them.

Designed by renowned British architect Alfred Waterhouse, Turner's Grade II listed building was completed just two years after his most famous work - London's Natural History Museum. Commissioned by philanthropist Anne Turner as a memorial to her husband and son, the space was designed to support men whose illness resulted in significant social exclusion.

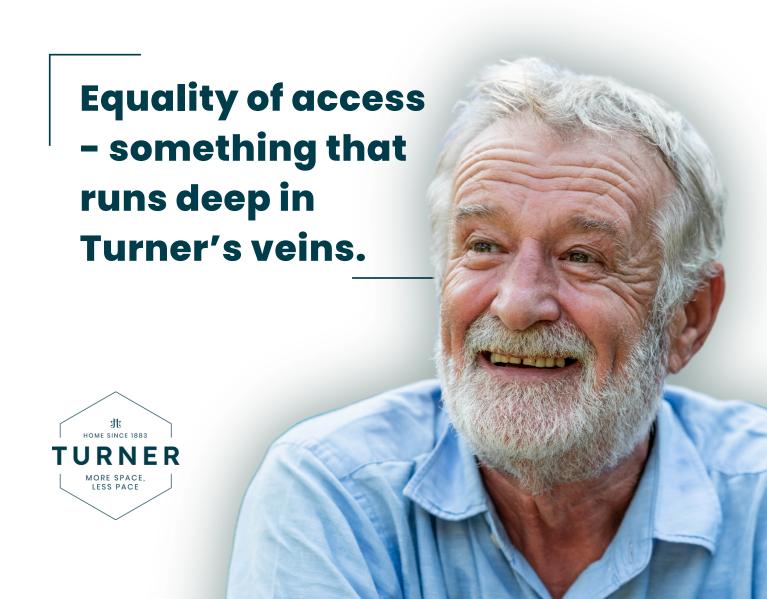
This emphasis is still maintained today. The men we support in the 21st century continue to be at the edges of society, often considered 'too complex' for mainstream services, unfairly described as 'aggressive', 'resistant' or 'problematic'. Without Turner, our residents would likely live in hospitals or secure settings, places that feel like services not homes. We pride ourselves on seeing beyond diagnoses and avoiding labelling, creating a place where people feel safe and cared for, but most importantly known and understood.

Our ability to manage these more complex needs in a homely setting is vital in improving both quality of life and reducing pressure on the wider health and social care system.

As a city Liverpool has high and worsening health inequalities with mental health challenge, dementia and brain injury diagnoses all above the national average. This increasing need reiterates the vital importance of our work, work that will likely see more demand in the short to medium term. Our teams and our Board are absolutely committed to doing everything we can to both meet, and reduce, local need.

At the heart of Turner's legacy is a commitment to equality of access, something that runs deep in the organisation's veins. Our home is located in Dingle, Liverpool, an area of disadvantage that benefits from the city's known community spirit and absolute dedication to social acceptance and equal opportunity.

Today the world of care and support looks very different to the 19th century model setup by Anne Turner, yet our long-developed knowledge and experience continues to make significant impact - supporting men to respond differently to their thoughts and feelings and to be stay safe, be happy and have hope.
